It is imperative that we obtain the type of software each Contractor is utilizing for completion and submission of their Certified Payroll to the District offices in order for our IT Team to determine compatibility with the CR & L software. This program will increase the efficiency in which payrolls are checked for correctness with the Wage Decisions assigned to Contracts that you are submitting the payrolls for.

Your response **deadline** for submitting this information is by the close of business on **Thursday, July 30**, 2015. This will allow the agency the time to assist our contractors in the transition to this new software.

It's that time of the year, so take the necessary precautions to prevent the following heat-related illnesses.

Heat stroke, the most serious form of heat-related illness, happens when the body becomes unable to regulate its core temperature. Sweating stops and the body can no longer rid itself of excess heat. Signs include confusion, loss of consciousness, and seizures. "Heat stroke is a medical emergency that may result in death! Call 911 immediately. *Heat exhaustion* is the body's response to loss of water and salt from heavy sweating. Signs include headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness, irritability, thirst, and heavy sweating.

Heat cramps are caused by the loss of body salts and fluid during sweating. Low salt levels in muscles cause painful cramps. Tired muscles—those used for performing the work—are usually the ones most affected by cramps. Cramps may occur during or after working hours.

Heat rash, also known as prickly heat, is skin irritation caused by sweat that does not evaporate from the skin. Heat rash is the most common problem in hot work environments.

The chart below shows **symptoms** and **first aid measures** to take, if a worker shows signs of a heat-related illness.

Illness	Symptoms	First Aid [*]
Heat stroke	Confusion	Call 911
	Fainting	While waiting for help: Place worker in shady, cool area
	Seizures Excessive sweating or red, hot,	Loosen clothing, remove outer clothing
	dry skin Very high body temperature	Fan air on worker; cold packs in armpits
		Wet worker with cool water; apply ice packs, cool compresses, or ice if available
		Provide fluids (preferably water) as soon as possible
		Stay with worker until help arrives



Heat Related Illnesses & First Aid	Heat exhaustion	Cool, moist skin Heavy sweating Headache Nausea or vomiting Dizziness Light headedness Weakness Thirst Irritability Fast heart beat	 Have worker sit or lie down in a cool, shady area Give worker plenty of water or other cool beverages to drink Cool worker with cold compresses/ice packs Take to clinic or emergency room for medical evaluation or treatment if signs or symptoms worsen or do not improve within 60 minutes. Do not return to work that day
	Heat cramps	Muscle spasms Pain Usually in abdomen, arms, or legs	 Have worker rest in shady, cool area Worker should drink water or other cool beverages Wait a few hours before allowing worker to return to strenuous work Have worker seek medical attention if cramps don't go away
	Heat rash	Clusters of red bumps on skin Often appears on neck, upper chest, folds of skin	Try to work in a cooler, less humid environment when possible Keep the affected area dry
