



KUDOS:

As just one relatively unknown and rarely mentioned example of activity in the hurricane damaged areas, the Houma-based group, **Terrebonne Readiness and Assistance Coalition**, known as TRAC has quietly and effectively concentrated on helping families rebuild after a disaster. TRAC helps victims file claims, find volunteer labor for home repairs, contact appropriate agencies for specific needs, and much more. TRAC is a community and faith based non-profit organization that began helping south Louisiana residents with storm preparation & recovery in 1992, shortly after Hurricane Andrew ravaged the state's coast.




AFTER the HURRICANES:

To Preserve And Protect: Honoring History On The Road To Recovery

BATON ROUGE, La.-- Whether funding the rebuilding of a neighborhood, restoring an old courthouse, or any of thousands of other projects, an important role of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is to assist a community in recovering from disasters while being sensitive to the community's historic places.

The goal is to protect public and private buildings that have special value because of architectural or historical significance. In particular, FEMA works with officials from the state's Office of Historic Preservation to make sure these important sites and structures are brought back as close as possible to pre-disaster condition, and are not further damaged by any reconstruction efforts.

FEMA and the state are bound by law to protect all sites and structures on the National Register of Historic Places, and to protect any structure more than 45 years old that may qualify for such designation.

Anytime FEMA funds or even considers funding a project, the agency conducts a review to make sure valuable historic sites are protected. This includes public works projects to repair local government buildings or infrastructure and community mitigation programs.

In Louisiana, FEMA has reviewed nearly 6,000 Public Assistance grant applications and approximately 250,000 damaged structures for possible historic preservation protection. In many cases, a local government can include preservation costs in its application for federal funds. There are 1,245 sites in the state listed on the National Register of Historic sites, 137 of them in New Orleans.

NEW COURSEs at EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT INSTITUTE [EMI] THIS SUMMER Emmitsburg, Maryland

The new ADVANCED FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT CONCEPTS course (E194) is a series of modules designed for floodplain managers with over three (3) years of full-time floodplain management experience.

The four modules in the course are NFIP Floodplain Rules & Regulations in Depth; LOMC Procedures and Floodplain Mgmnt. Implications; Roles & Responsibilities of the Local Floodplain Manager; and Substantial Damage/Substantial Improvement. - June 26-29 and August 28-31, 2006

MANAGING FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT through the NFIP TRAIN-THE TRAINER (E270) is a four-day course designed to train subject matter experts in how to deliver an effective and interesting course on floodplain management topics. - <u>July 10-13 and September 25-28, 2006</u>

"new" FEMA Elevation Certificate



HAZARD MITIGATION GRANT PROGRAM SAFER, STRONGER, SMARTER

"What actions has the LRA taken regarding the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP)?

The LRA passed a resolution aimed at providing incentives for communities and parishes to adopt the most up-to-date flood guidance as part of their floodplain management ordinances, by agreeing to only provide HMGP funding in those parishes that adopt and enforce FEMA's Flood Advisory Elevation guidance in the construction or reconstruction of **all** homes, businesses, and other structures in the aftermath of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita."
